



THE JOURNEY CATHOLIC RADIO PROGRAM — AIRS SUNDAY 12 AUGUST 2018 —



My dear people,

The universal Church celebrates on Wednesday the Solemn Feast of Our Lady's Assumption. The Catechism contains a succinct summary of this dogma: *"The Most Blessed Virgin Mary, when the course of her earthly life was completed, was taken up body and soul into the glory of heaven, where she already shares in the glory of her Son's Resurrection, anticipating the resurrection of all members of His Body."* (#974).

The proclamation of this dogma on 1st November 1950 by Pope Pius XII, is the only declared exercise of papal infallibility. But it was also an exercise of the infallibility of Christ's Church. In 1946 Pope Pius sent a letter to all the Bishops of the world asking two questions: "(1) Do you judge that the bodily Assumption of the Blessed Virgin can be proposed and defined as a dogma of the faith? (2) Do you, with your clergy and people, desire it?". With only a few exceptions (some wondered the necessity of declaring this a dogma since everyone believed it), the resounding answer was YES.



The Catholic people were already expressing this truth in many ways. They had always frequented churches on 15th August, and were reciting a decade of the Rosary in honour of the Assumption in their private prayer. Under the title of the Assumption, countless churches had been dedicated. The definition came as little surprise. But why 1950?

Pius XII had come to the papacy in March 1939 as war clouds began to blacken the skies of Europe. Before the year was over, Germany had invaded Poland and World War II had begun. For the next ten years Pius would lead the Church through one of the most agonising periods of its history. He would witness the physical destruction of Europe, the defeat of Nazism and Fascism, the internal struggle against Communism in his own Italy, the persecution of the Church in Eastern Europe. He would be overwhelmed with grief by the extermination of 6 million Jews and 4 million Christians. He would see China opt for Communism which would wipe out the Catholic Church which had only begun to flourish there. He would witness the dropping of the atomic bomb, and the awe that began to settle over the world as the threat of a nuclear holocaust became possible. Two Cardinals would be sentenced to imprisonment by Communist regimes—Cardinal Mindszenty of Hungary and Cardinal Stepinac (now Blessed) of Yugoslavia. Inside the Church theological opinions would begin to question the basics of the Faith.

In this climate the Pope called a Holy Year for 1950. It was to be the Year of the Great Return, a Year of the Great Pardon as he called it. He appealed both to the faithful and to all people of good will to make reparation for the sins committed against the dignity of the human race. He was greatly devoted to Our Lady, having been consecrated a bishop on 13th May 1917, the day of the first apparition of Our Lady at Fatima.

In this post-war atmosphere, Pope Pius hoped by his definition of the dogma of the Assumption to give glory to God, the giver of all gifts, including the gift of Mary. He hoped that greater devotion to Our Lady would bring people back to God and thus improve social and moral life, and bring the universal peace all hoped for. Another benefit of the dogma, he believed, was that calling attention to the bodily Assumption of Mary would remind all men and women that the human body is sacred, and that the whole person, body and soul, is holy and destined to live forever. As he so clearly stated, the declaration of the Assumption would make our belief in our own resurrection stronger.

The Assumption is one of the most important dogmas of our Faith because it bears direct reference on our own lives. "Father, I want those You have given me to be with me where I am," Christ prayed at the Last Supper. The Assumption announces the beginning of the fulfilment of that prayer. What God has done for Mary, He intends to do for each one of us.
