



My dear people,

Next Sunday, during the Synod of Bishops in Rome, Pope Francis will canonise several Saints. One is *Archbishop Oscar Romeo*, Archbishop of San Salvador in South America, a modern Thomas à Becket. "We know that every effort to improve society, especially when society is so full of injustice and sin, is an effort that God blesses, that God demands of us." So he ended his homily on 24 March 1980. Minutes later, as he raised the chalice, a hired assassin shot and killed him. His total union with Christ's sacrifice was completed.

This modern martyr was born in El Salvador on the Feast of the Assumption 1917. He was ordained a priest in 1942, eventually becoming Archbishop in 1977, at a time of extreme social and political repression in the country. As a young priest he appeared timid. But what changed this timid lamb into a formidable warrior for Christ was the slaughter of a Jesuit priest within days of his appointment. The shocking incident had a profound effect on the Archbishop. He immediately issued a communiqué criticising the government for interfering in the affairs of the Church, and drafted a Pastoral Letter condemning repression, killings, tortures, disappearances, and other violations of human rights.



His ideas became intolerable to some, but he persisted, saying that he had an obligation to remain on the side of the oppressed. Archbishop Romero found himself in the midst of a struggle he could not avoid. Since 1932, when 30,000 peasants were killed by the army, the slaughter and brutality continued. Two percent of the people owned sixty percent of the land. Seventy-five percent of the country's export earnings went to less than two hundred families. Approximately fifty percent of the population were unemployed. Ninety percent of families earned less than \$100 a year. Four-fifths of the children were underfed.

Torture, murder, mysterious disappearances had been documented by international agencies. The Church itself - clergy, religious, and lay leaders - had been under attack. In 1972 Father Nicholas Rodrigues was arrested by the National Guard. His dismembered body was found four days later. A group of students were jailed and tortured simply for organising a literary class for peasants.

Every Sunday morning at the Cathedral of San Salvador, Romero delivered homilies that were broadcast to the whole country. The challenge, he said, was to empower Christians so "that they will be a ferment and not fermented; that they will be salt; that they be an element of purification in all struggles and in all organisations; that they be a light that illumines the process of change."

"It is inconceivable," he said in a homily on 9 September 1979, "that someone is called 'Christian' and does not give preference to the poor as Christ did. Many believe that when the Church says 'for the poor' she is becoming communist, she is being political. This is not the case. We must take the cause of the poor seriously, for it is indeed the very cause of Jesus Christ."

Violence approached closer. On 13 March 1980, a bomb wrecked the offices of the Commission of Human Rights. On 16 March, seventy-two sticks of dynamite were discovered in the sacristy of the Cathedral. Friends pleaded with him to seek asylum in another country. "As a shepherd," he said, "I am obliged by divine mandate to give my life for those I love, the Salvadorans. I feel that I must be faithful to that calling. There exists a terrible situation among the poor. I felt I had to be the voice of all those people without a voice."

The statement that sealed the Archbishop's fate was his appeal to the armed forces: "In a special manner I would like to issue a call to the men of the armed forces and specifically to the bases of the Guardia Nacional and the police headquarters. Brothers, you are of our same people. You are killing your own

brother peasants. And against a man's order to kill, there should prevail the Law of God which says: 'Do not kill'. No solider is obliged to obey an order against the Law of God. No one has to obey an immoral law." Death was inevitable.
