But he wasn't up to it - riches got in the way.



As he went away, a sadness descended on him, the sadness that descends on us when we choose to live for ourselves.

GET THE FACTS ABOUT HOMELESSNESS AND THE HOUSING CRISIS

“The 2016 Census has revealed there are 116,427 people in Australia who are homeless ... That number includes not only people who are on the streets or sleeping rough, but also those who are ‘couch surfing’, living in boarding houses or emergency accommodation, or staying in severely overcrowded dwellings. The people we see on the streets are just the tip of the iceberg.” (*Social Justice Statement 2018-2019, p.6*).

Homelessness can often be a hidden problem and it is not confined to our major cities. There are many factors that can lead to homelessness, but ultimately it is a result of poverty. Find out what the housing issues are in your local area from research bodies such as:

My dear people,

Also being canonised today is my favourite Pope — Paul VI. He was elected in 1963, my second year in the seminary, following the death of “Good Pope John” XXIII. In many ways, I consider Paul the greater man. John had faithfully heeded the prompting of the Holy Spirit, and surprised the world by announcing an Ecumenical Council, but it was Paul who continued it and lived out the consequences.

Giovanni Battista Montini was born in Brescia on 26 September 1897 (this date is to be his future Feast Day). He was ordained a priest on 29 May 1920. He completed degrees in philosophy and civil law in Rome, and in canon law in Milan. He was appointed attaché at the Apostolic Nunciature in Warsaw in 1923, and in 1924 he returned to Rome to serve in the Secretariat of State. Throughout the 1920s and 1930s he made many religious and cultural visits within Italy and beyond. This was the prelude of what was to come.

During his service of the Holy See he was much appreciated by Pope Pius XI and Pope Pius XII. On 13 December 1937 he was appointed Substitute of the Secretariat of State. In these years of diplomatic service he made every effort to engage directly in pastoral ministry and the care of souls. He did charitable activity in the Roman suburbs and was involved with the Conferences of the St Vincent de Paul Society.

During World War II he oversaw the Vatican Information Office (a great help in finding missing persons internationally), and was engaged in helping refugees and Jews (he would have been well aware of Pius XII’s secret direction to Rome’s convents and monasteries to open their doors to Jews). He took a deep interest in the development of new political movements of Catholics (the Christian Democrat Party) and strengthened the first steps of international organisations of the laity.

On 1 November 1954 he was appointed Archbishop of Milan. In that enormous and complex diocese he employed new methods of evangelisation to deal with growing immigration and to help overcome materialism and Marxist ideology, above all in the workplace. He made trips to the USA, Brazil, and to various Milanese missions in Africa. On 15 December 1958 he was elevated to the College of Cardinals by John XXIII with whom he had been friends since 1925. He was very much involved in the preparatory work of the Second Vatican Council.

On 21 June 1963 he was elected Pope and took the name, surprisingly, of Paul VI, “out of devotion to the Apostle Paul, the first theologian of Christ who took the Gospel to the world of his time.” And so he initiated the practice of Apostolic Journeys, travelling to every continent, starting with the Holy Land — he was the first Pope to return to Jerusalem since St Peter himself! That was awesome in itself. There his historic meeting with the Orthodox Patriarch Athenagoras took place — the first meeting of East and West in 1,000 years!

Paul was the first Pope to address the United Nations. He did so during the Second Vatican Council, and before the entire world made his heart-warming appeal: “No more war!”. He was the first Pope to visit Fatima, attending its Golden Jubilee and meeting with Sister Lucia. He visited Turkey, Columbia, Geneva, Uganda and the Far East. He was, of course, the first Pope to set foot on Australian soil, arriving here in November 1970 for the celebration of the Captain Cook Bicentenary. (I was in the crowd to welcome him at the airport — Jeff ‘Muttonchops’ Bates obtained tickets for the priests of the Diocese). Two days later I was in St Mary’s Cathedral where Paul gave an address to the priests of Australia and New Zealand. He then stood, faced the altar, and intoned the words of the Creed in Latin. 3,000 male voices took up the Creed, and I had the greatest sensation of the unity and the history of the Church.

Many would forget he survived an assassination attempt in Manila on his way here. Knowing he was being listened to by members of many faiths, he cried out: “To you Christians I repeat His Name, to everyone I proclaim Him: Jesus Christ! He is the beginning and the end, He is our constant preaching; it is His Name that we proclaim to the ends of the earth, and throughout all ages!”.

Paul’s Encyclical Letters were groundbreaking, and for this he will be named in history Paul the Great! His first, *Ecclesiam Suam* (1964), gave rise to the method of “the dialogue of salvation” within the Church and with the entire world. Others were *Mysterium fidei* (on the Eucharist), *Populorum progressio* (‘on the Development of Peoples’), *Sacerdotalis caelibatus* (on Priestly Celibacy), and *Humanae Vitae* (‘on the Transmission of Human Life’) which contained one of the best definitions of marriage ever composed. His *Marialis Cultus* will forever remain a basic text on Devotion to Our Lady. *Evangelium Nuntiandi* (which some say John Paul II helped write) will always be the basic text for preaching the Gospel in the modern world. Paul wrote his now-famous saying, “Modern man listens more willingly to witnesses than to teachers, and if he does listen to teachers, it is because they are witnesses”. In the Year of Faith 1967-68, commemorating the 19th centenary of the martyrdom of Sts Peter and Paul, Pope Paul composed “the Credo of the People of God”, a summary of the basic teachings of the Faith.

His character was reserved, humble and kindly. He possessed an exceptional human sensitivity. He was a man of profound spirituality, based on the Scriptures, the great mystics, adoration of the Blessed Sacrament, and devotion to Our Lady. Paul died on the Feast of the Transfiguration, 6 August 1978, having been Pope for fifteen years.

He wrote in his Last Will and Testament (and I used it as the theme of my Silver Jubilee), “I praise Him for His crazy kindness by which He made a sick man His chosen one.” It was Paul who, at the conclusion of the Second Vatican Council, gave Our Lady a new title “Mother of the Church”. Pope St Paul VI’s Feast Day is to be 26 September.
