THIRD SUNDAY OF ADVENT – YEAR C

16 DECEMBER 2018

READINGS: Zeph 3:14-18; Phil 4:4-7; Luke 3:10-18

The prophet Zephaniah, writing in the seventh century BC, bids Jerusalem rejoice because her salvation is near. God stands in her midst and will deliver her from her enemies (**FIRST READING**).

God is portrayed not only as a king and warrior, but as the loving bridegroom of an unfaithful bride. St Paul calls on the faithful at Philippi to rejoice because the Lord is near, Paul believing that the Second Coming was imminent (**SECOND READING**).

St John the Baptist spells out for the people what they must do to prepare for the Messiah (**GOSPEL**).

NATIVITY NAIVETY

Loretta Plenkinsop was the newest and youngest teacher at St Gretelburger’s Parish School. She did not seem to notice that when the principal, Mark Greenbank, asked at the staff meeting “Who would like to direct the Nativity play this year?” all her colleagues—every man and woman—looked down at the table and began to shuffle papers.

Loretta, with the idealism born of innocence and inexperience, said she would love to do it. A collective sigh of relief came from the rest of the staff as her offer was unanimously accepted. The first rehearsal was held the next day.

Loretta began with the customary warning: “You must be very good at these practices. Any child who is naughty won’t be allowed to stay. Anna Maria, you can be Mary, and Damian will be Joseph. Shane will be the innkeeper and the shepherds are ... now everybody has a part. No, Thomas, you are one of the sheep, you can’t be an elephant - there were no elephants at Bethlehem. How do I know? Well, it’s not in the Bible. Of course they didn’t forget to write it in. Don’t be silly.

“Now, Damian, you knock on the door and say ‘My wife is having a baby. Can we stay here for the night...?’ . No, the innkeeper won’t let you stay even if you give him some money, I don’t care what your dad said to the motel manager in the holidays ...

“The angels can wait at the side until it is time to come in. Ben, you can’t carry a sword ... it doesn’t matter that the angels on the war memorial in High Street have swords—you are an angel of peace. Don’t be silly, you won’t be bringing peace by killing all the bad people.

“We’ll start from the beginning, again ...

“There’s the bell. Please come here tomorrow as soon as the dinner bell goes.”

My dear people,

Many of the pictures of Our Lady are great works of art, painted by famous artists. Some statues have fascinating histories, either because of the circumstances of their discovery, or for the miracles they have wrought, or the beauty of their composition.

But an Italian peasant called Bartolo Longo, who wanted to build a shrine to Our Lady at Pompeii, had no money at all, and he knew his fellow peasants were also without means, so a fundraising campaign would have had little result.

The year was 1872. Bartolo believed he was being called to say the Rosary and should ask others to do so. He knew that in order to establish a Confraternity where they could pray together, the group should possess an image of Our Lady. Bartolo decided not to wait until he had sufficient funds—he went to a junk shop in Naples and bought a picture of Our Lady which cost less than a dollar. The picture was insignificant, its author unknown. It showed the Blessed Virgin and the Holy Child giving the Rosary to St Domini and St Catherine of Siena. And in addition to its nondescript appearance, there was a large hole in the canvas.



When Bartolo returned to Pompeii with his purchase, his friends turned up their noses at the picture, and refused to accept it as the official image of their circle. But Bartolo began his little shrine, and even embellished the painting he had found in the Naples junk shop. Relying on Divine Providence, he built an orphanage for over a thousand girls next to the shrine, and created a printing, cabinetmaking and leather workshop to provide jobs for the neglected sons of criminal prisoners. As the fame of his little Sanctuary grew, a well-known Neapolitan painter restored Our Lady's image. Now it is considered one of the loveliest Madonnas in Italy.

Today in Pompeii stands a lovely Basilica visited by a million pilgrims each year. The significance of the Pompeii shrine is enormous. It is one of those centres which reveals the social message of the Gospel. There are very

few regions of Europe which have been so poverty-stricken as the provinces of Southern Italy. This Sanctuary has sprung entirely from the hearts of the people of the province of Naples. The Basilica was built from their pennies, yet at the same time, it has become the source of their hope.

When I was here in the nineties, Antonia Marciano received a visit from a friend who lived in Pompeii. She noticed we did not have a picture of Our Lady of Pompeii, and promised to send us a copy—a gift from one Shrine to another. In due course it arrived—a copy on canvas, the same size as the original. In all this time it has had its home in St Joseph's Room, part of which used to be a chapel. I thought it should be enshrined in the Church. It is now over the front door under the choir gallery.

Bartolo Longo was beatified by Pope John Paul II on 26 October 1980.
