Message from Fr Duane

Last week was a wonderful celebration of the reopening of our newly renovated church. The entire project has seen so much generosity from so many parishioners, culminating in the wonderful morning tea attended by about 100 people who stayed after Mass. Thank you to the Catholic Women's League for providing such a wonderful morning tea, and to all who attended. We will continue to celebrate this project with photos and stories, as we reflect upon the recent and more distant history of our parish at this time.

It is worthwhile remembering the deeper reason for the beautification of our church buildings – as the Second Vatican Council documents taught, "all things set apart for use in divine worship should be truly worthy, becoming, and beautiful, signs and symbols of the supernatural world...the Church has been particularly careful to see that sacred furnishings should worthily and beautifully serve the dignity of worship" (Sacrosanctum Concilium – The Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy – paragraph 122). At the same time, let us also remember the words of Scripture, that we ourselves are living stones building up the Temple of God, the Body of Christ - "Come to him, a living stone, though rejected by mortals yet chosen and precious in God's sight, and like living stones let yourselves be built into a spiritual house, to be a holy priesthood, to offer spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ (1 Peter 2:4-5). May we all be grateful and inspired by the generosity of the countless living stones in our community, who have worked together to make our church building even more fitting for the dignity of worship.

Finally, one of the most beautiful and fruitful forms of worship is **Eucharistic Adoration**. Pope Francis recently said "Only in adoration, only before the Lord can the taste and passion for evangelisation be recovered". He went on to say, "Curiously, the prayer of adoration — we have lost it. We have lost it, and everyone — priests, bishops, consecrated men and women, laypeople — have to recover it. It's to be in silence, before the Lord", he said, putting before us the example of St Teresa of Calcutta (Mother Teresa), who he said, while "involved in so many things in life, never gave up adoration even at times when her faith wavered and she wondered if it was all true or not". We have now a new opportunity to enter into this beautiful form of worship, finding silence before the Lord in the midst of the busyness and noise of life, in our renewed and beautiful church, starting on Friday 6th October and continuing **every First Friday of the month from 7pm to 10pm**. Thank you to all who have committed themselves to an hour or more of Adoration during this time in order to make this possible. If anyone else would like to commit to a time, there is still time to do so, otherwise simply come along for any part of those 3 hours, where, in the words of the Pope, "we encounter the one who gave everything for us, who sacrificed himself in order to give us life, who loved us to the end."

Christ will be glorified in my body, whether by my life or by my death. Life to me, of course, is Christ, but then death would bring me something more; but then again, if living in this body means doing work which is having good results – I do not know what I should choose. I am caught in this dilemma: I want to be gone and be with Christ, which would be very much the better, but for me to stay alive in this body is a more urgent need for your sake.

Gospel - Matthew 20:1-16

Why are you jealous because I am generous

Jesus said to his disciples: 'The kingdom of heaven is like a landowner going out at daybreak to hire workers for his vineyard. He made an agreement with the workers for one denarius a day, and sent them to his vineyard. Going out at about the third hour he saw others standing idle in the market place and said to them, "You go to my vineyard too and I will give you a fair wage." So they went. At about the sixth hour and again at about the ninth hour, he went out and did the same. Then at about the eleventh hour he went out and found more men standing round, and he said to them, "Why have you been standing here idle all day?" "Because no one has hired us" they answered. He said to them, "You go into my vineyard too." In the evening, the owner of the vineyard said to his bailiff, "Call the workers and pay them their wages, starting with the last arrivals and ending with the first." So those who were hired at about the eleventh hour came forward and received one denarius each. When the first came, they expected to get more, but they too received one denarius each. They took it, but grumbled at the landowner. "The men who came last" they said "have done only one hour, and you have treated them the same as us, though we have done a heavy day's work in all the heat." He answered one of them and said, "My friend, I am not being unjust to you; did we not agree on one denarius? Take your earnings and go. I choose to pay the last comer as much as I pay you. Have I no right to do what I like with my own? Why be envious because I am generous?" Thus the last will be first, and the first, last.'
